Notes from the Parsonage by our Chaplain, Rev. Paula.

One of my abiding childhood memories is of my father creating a little fire on the patio on one of the days leading up to the beginning of Lent. What he was doing was burning some of the previous year's palm crosses in order to create some ash to be used at the service on Ash Wednesday, and traditionally this is how it is done.

Unfortunately, palm crosses are really hard to burn, so my Dad's solution was to add in a page from a national newspaper to help them catch light. This was a family secret that we kept throughout his life, until all was revealed at his funeral. I have only once tried to follow suit. Maybe it was because my politics (and therefore my preferred newspaper) were rather different from his, but I had no success at all in creating ash that way. Happily, nowadays you can buy ready-made ash from specialist liturgical suppliers, and I have brought some with me from the UK.

Ash Wednesday this year is on 6 March. The tradition of "imposing" ash on the foreheads of the faithful is an ancient one. It's intended as a reminder that our lives are short and are to be lived to the full. The previous day, Shrove Tuesday, is often marked by mardi gras (or "Fat Tuesday") celebrations when Christians eat up the "sinful" foods, particularly eggs and fats, before the penitential period of Lent begins, hence the English fondness for pancakes. Celebrations in other parts of the world are of course rather more colourful.

During the Ash Wednesday service, the priest uses the ashes to make a sign of the cross on people's foreheads, with the words: "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ". And in the six weeks that follow, we shall be looking for ways to do just that.

Our Ash Wednesday service of Holy Communion and imposition of ashes is at 10.00 am on 6 March. Why not come along and give it a try. Our services: Holy Communion on Sundays at 9.30 am and 11.00 am and on Wednesdays at 10.00 am. Taizé worship on the following Thursdays at 5.30 pm: 28

February, 14 and 28 March.





Bishop Robert's Lenten Appeal

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Mental Health and Livelihoods Support for the Vulnerable in Greece

I send you this appeal as we begin to prepare our hearts and minds for the beginning of Lent in three weeks' time.

Natural as well as man-made disasters in our world bring hurt and heartbreak to all those affected. They remind us of the fragility of our human existence, wherever we live. Where natural disaster has occurred, there is physical suffering: the tragedy of lives lost, or the pain of families, homes and livelihoods devastated. But the wounds are also psychological. And they frequently do not manifest themselves immediately, but later on. This is especially true for the vulnerable and applies particularly to children. In July 2018, the resort village of Mati witnessed Greece's worst ever forest fires. The death toll reached 100, over 200 people injured, and over 700 evacuated from their homes. To these numbers, we should add the number suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and other psychological aftereffects.

An Athens-based organisation called Hestia Hellas is providing a vulnerable community with sustainable tools and a skill set necessary to participate in daily life and thrive in times of difficulties. Greece is facing multiple challenges including an economic crisis, an influx of refugees and migrants and the devastating fires that have deprived many families from housing and jobs. Hestia Hellas is dedicated to offering psycho-social support services, Child Friendly Space, jobs and life skills support, and food distribution to those in need. And please do consider how you can support my appeal. As usual, you can give money to this appeal through your church treasurer, who will forward money to the diocesan office.


Even now, after almost 30 years, Ann-Louise is still a member of the Church Council.

Maundy Thursday Service – 18th April at 5pm



The 5.00 pm service on Maundy Thursday will be a Holy Communion service that includes washing the feet of those who wish it. This is an ancient custom that follows the example of Jesus who washed his disciples' feet at the Last Supper. Traditionally the priest kneels at the feet of members of her congregation to do this.

Jesus said, "If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet" (John 13.14).

The Power of Prayer

To pray is to make our hearts ready to experience the love of God in Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. Praying regularly will help us to develop a spiritual rhythm. A discipline of prayer changes the way that we think about our lives, because it creates new habits of heart and mind. Prayer opens us more deeply to the transforming grace of God. We enter into God's presence, allowing the Holy Spirit to pray in us.

Remember that God hears every prayer—but not all prayers are answered in the way we might expect or desire: we don't always pray for his will to be done! Prayer is a discipline - it can be difficult at times, just like keeping fit, being on a diet, or keeping weeds down in the garden. Little and often is best, but don't give up! No prayer, however inadequate you may feel it to be, is ever wasted or of no value.

According to the Bible, the power of prayer is, quite simply, the power of God, who hears and answers prayer.

Consider:

- 1) The Lord God Almighty can do all things; there is nothing impossible for Him (Luke 1:37).
- 2) The Lord God Almighty invites His people to pray to Him. Prayer to God should be made persistently (Luke 18:1), with thanksgiving (Philippians 4:6), in faith (James 1:5), within the will of God (Matthew 6:10), for the glory of God (John 14:13-14), and from a heart right with God).
- 3) The Lord God Almighty hears the prayers of His children. He commands us to pray, and He promises to listen when we do. "In my distress I called to the LORD; I cried to my God for help. From his temple he heard my voice; my cry came before him, into his ears". (Psalm 18:6).
- 4) The Lord God Almighty answers prayer. "I call on you, O God, for you will answer me" (Psalm 17:6). "The righteous cry out, and the LORD hears them; he delivers them from all their troubles".

A popular idea is that the amount of faith we have determines whether or not God will answer our prayers. However, sometimes the Lord answers our prayers in spite of our own lack of faith. In Acts 12, the church prays for Peter's release from prison (v. 5), and God answers their prayer (vv. 7-11). Peter goes to the door of the prayer meeting and knocks, but those who are praying refuse at first to believe that it is really Peter. They prayed he would be released, but they failed to expect an answer to their prayers.

The power of prayer does not flow from us. The power of prayer comes from God who hears our prayers and answers them. Prayer places us in contact with Almighty God, and we should expect almighty results, whether or not He chooses to grant our petitions or deny our requests. Whatever the answer to our prayers, the God to whom we pray is the source of the power of prayer, and He can and will answer us, according to His perfect will and timing. http://www.allsaintschurchdedworth.co.uk/learning-to-pray/

Shrove Tuesday – A fun history of the Pancake

Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday, is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent – the 40 days leading up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, <u>Anglo-Saxon</u> Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday, so the date varies from year to year and falls between February 3 and March 9. In 2019 Shrove Tuesday will fall on the 5th March.

Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients. The pancake has a very long history and is featured in cookery books as far back as 1439. The tradition of tossing or flipping them is almost as old: "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne." (Pasquil's Palin, 1619).

In the UK, pancake races form an important part of the Shrove Tuesday celebrations – an opportunity for large numbers of people, often in fancy dress, to race down streets tossing pancakes. The object of the race is to get to the finishing line first, carrying a frying pan with a cooked pancake in it and flipping the pancake as you run.

The most famous pancake race takes place at Olney in <u>Buckinghamshire</u>. According to tradition, in 1445 a woman of Olney heard the shriving bell while she was making pancakes and ran to the church in her apron, still clutching her frying pan. The Olney pancake race is now world famous. Competitors have to be local housewives and they must wear an apron and a hat or scarf.





Each contestant has a frying pan containing a hot pancake. She must toss it three times during the race. The first woman to complete the course and arrive at the church, serve her pancake to the bell ringer or church warden and be kissed by him, is the winner.




Taizé prayer is the creation of a monastic community in Taizé, France, founded in the 1940s by a Swiss man known as Brother Roger Brother Roger was especially interested in bringing Catholics and Protestants together.

There is no preaching, no teaching, no talk of sin or repentance or forgiveness. There is just this elegantly simple service: short chants, often in Latin, repeated over and over in the candlelight. Plus, some short Scripture readings or psalms, accompanied by candles and short periods of silent pray, where we lift our hearts and innermost thoughts and praises to God.

Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday or Easter Day is the most important day of the year for Christians. It is when we celebrate that three days after being killed, Jesus rose from the dead, sometimes called 'the Resurrection' and defeated evil forever. Many Churches start the Easter Sunday celebrations at Midnight on Easter Eve. Candles are used in churches all over the world to start the Easter Day Midnight celebrations. Candles help Christians to remember that Jesus is the light of the world and that when he rose to life on Easter Day, he overcame the darkness of evil.

In some churches, the service starts in darkness. Then twelve candles are lit, and these are taken round the rest of the church lighting the other candles. When a candle is lit the Priest says, 'Christ is Risen!' and the congregation responds, 'He is Risen Indeed!' Churches are filled with flowers on Easter Day. These represent new life. Priests wear their best, brightest robes in celebration.

If a Church has a model of a tomb in it from Good Friday, it will be empty with the stone rolled away, as it was on the first Easter Day. Easter Day is the end of Lent and means the end of some people's fasting.

Living out our Faith - Love your Neighbour as yourself (2)

It is a fact of nature; we humans are social animals and we do like to talk. Now there is nothing wrong with engaging in a nice long conversation with a friend or neighbour, who after all does not enjoy a good chat? But we must also be conscious of not overstepping the mark between chatting and gossiping.

Stop Gossip by Tightening Loose Tongues

Here are five ideas to help but the brakes on wagging tongues. As always, start with Self-firSt.

- 1. Make a conscious effort to monitor your own words. Actively listen to yourself. Make careful note of what you talk about, who you talk about and precisely what you say. Ensure that your words are Godly words that directly build-up, not tear down.
- 2. Make a conscious effort to monitor your own hearing. Whatever comes into your mind makes an impression. Do not listen to the juicy details about someone you know. Either move the conversation to a new subject or move along yourself.
- 3. Speak out to stop gossip. There is no need to be nasty, but just let people know you will not be a party to gossip. It might be easier to tell your close friends *before* gossip begins that you are trying to break a bad habit. When the talk starts, interrupt and remind people that you'd rather not talk about other people.
- 4. Assume unflattering stories are false. When you hear something tawdry about someone do you assume it is true? What if we all just assumed that the gossip was false? Would that slow things down?
- 5. Let gossip end with you. What if every piece of gossip depended upon you? Would it live or die? Slay gossip by refusing to repeat it. Keep count for the next week. How many pieces of gossip did you kill? You might be surprised.

Let us make a special effort as we approach Lent and Easter to Love one and other as the Lord commands us to.

The Safeguarding Officer's role is, amongst other things to: Work closely with the incumbent to advise within the parish on all safeguarding matters relating to children, young people and vulnerable adults; Receive, with the incumbent, any concerns about children or adults in the parish and make sure that proper advice and referrals are made; Report all matters relating to allegations of abuse against church officers. Maintain safeguarding records; The Safeguarding Office should regularly report on safeguarding in the parish. Safeguarding should be a standing agenda item at each PCC meeting. I lost more than a fifth of my body weight and became so weak that I was unable to complete even simple tasks. Ten months on I still struggle and have to take things easy. My life has been changed forever. However, I am determined to complete this walk to raise money to increase Sepsis awareness and will be eternally grateful for any support you are able to give me. 
After the success of the Epiphany Lunch which raised €500, we are looking forward to our next Social events to be held.
