

Notes from the Parsonage by Judith Rigby.

As I write this the wildfires continue to burn on the slopes of Teide, impacting 5 regions of our island. As we have been faced with the calima heat and temperatures well in the 30s I have followed with awe the stories of the many volunteer firefighters from our own and other neighbouring islands, dressed in heavy protective clothing and working in the skies and on the ground alongside the raging fires. Trusting and listening to each other they are working together to protect the homes of the 600 plus who were evacuated and to stabilise, control and extinguish 27km perimeter rings of fire.

I am also reminded that today the bishops from around the Anglican Communion gather for the 15th Lambeth Conference in Canterbury. The theme is God's Church for God's World - walking, listening and witnessing together. The fruit of their prayer, bible study, worship, fellowship and listening together will shape the life of the Anglican Communion for the next decade. Their biblical focus is the Book of 1 Peter. 1 Peter reflects the challenges that Peter's communities were facing: belonging, alienation, persecution, slavery and exile. Each time we pray the Our Father we pray: "Your Kingdom come. Your will be done." 1 Peter raises an inspiring vision of God's Kingdom. Have a read and you will see Peter encouraging his listeners to witness in their lives to Christ's hope and holiness.

One theme of the conference is Our Environment and Sustainable Development. Coming from many different corners of the globe those present will be able to speak to varying global crises, their impact on the most vulnerable and the Gospel call to serve the world in need. Listening will be imperative.

Deep listening is an act of surrender. We risk being changed by what we hear. As we listen to the stories from our own and other parts of the world impacted by global warming and climate change, we can ask ourselves what is at stake for the other person? Telling of our wildfires we know the impact of them on our island. The primary goal of listening is to deepen our own understanding. The hope is that in listening well we are changed by what we hear and new horizons will be opened for each listener.

In the life of All Saints, we pray this week: "May Your Kingdom come. Your Will be done. May we take seriously our responsibility to care for creation and sustain our earth. We pray for safety for all working on our behalf to protect our island home. Amen."



Living out our Faith

The Christian life is shaped around loving God and loving our neighbour

Christians believe that love is at the heart of God's will for our lives - love for God and love for others.

Jesus was once asked to name the greatest commandment. His reply - known as the 'Summary of the Law' - was this:

The first commandment is this: 'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is the only Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.'

The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.

Loving God and loving your neighbour belong together, and the best, most fruitful life is lived in loving communion with God our Creator, as well as with our fellow human beings.

Our lives need to be shaped in a rhythm of worship and service: love for God and love for others.

Commanded to love

'A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another.'

John 13:34 NKJV

Love can be a very misunderstood and misused word. We can overuse it and end up diluting its meaning. Do you really love chocolate as much as you love your family? Is the love you say you feel for your car the same love you feel for God? We use 'love' as a 'one-size-fits-all' verb, but real love is anything but.

Let's clear up a couple of misconceptions about it. We think love is a feeling – a sentimental knot in the stomach. True love does create feelings – but it's *more* than a feeling. A second misconception is that love is uncontrollable. Have you ever said, 'I fell in love' – like you'd accidentally tripped and stumbled? We might say, 'I can't help it if I'm in love,' or the opposite, 'I can't help it; I just don't love him/her anymore.' The fact that Jesus commands us to love one another means we do have some control over who we love and who we don't.

At its core, love is two things. First, *love is a matter of choice.* 'Over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity' (Colossians 3:14 NIV). Notice those two small words, 'put on'. Just as you choose the clothes you will wear each day, you also choose the attitude you will display. So, love is controllable. Second, *love is a matter of behaviour.* 'Let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth' (1 John 3:18 NIV). It works like this: when you reach out towards someone with genuine love and concern, your feelings towards that person change. And even if they don't return your love, God is pleased with you. And that's the best reward!

What Now?

Before you start your day, pray: 'Father, help me to reach out with love to people I meet today. Help me show Your love to everyone, even those I find difficult to get along with.'

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Lives of the Saints By Krysia

There are multiple thousands of Saints in heaven many of which have not been recognized or heard of, and so remain as silent as breaths of fresh air. Saints were remarkable people during their lifetime and an inspiration to us all, one of these Saints was not only mystical, but also considered totally fascinating.

This was Saint Joseph of Cupertino, Italy 1603--1663.


Joseph's childhood was spent with his widowed mother. As a child he had difficulty comprehending things and was extremely clumsy. He only wanted to be a monk and was finally accepted as a stable boy at a Franciscan house until in 1628 he became a priest. From that time on Joseph had ecstatic trances and levitations. This of course attracted curiosity as news of his miracles spread. The community decided he should be kept out of the choir and refectory because of his behaviour. In 1653 the church authorities transferred Joseph to a friary in the hills of Pietarossa there he was kept out of sight.


Finally, Joseph returned to his order Osmio and was placed in a small cell 6x6x6 foot high and kept out of sight. During the remainder of his life, he bore his confinement without complaint, until his death 1663. St Joseph of Cupertino is the Patron Saint of taking tests and of students. He is also the Patron Saint of Aviation, Astronauts and those with learning difficulties.

Sceptics like to play this down his levitations by saying Joseph jumped and leaped about, but the difference is - Levitations are soft and gently uplifting.

My personal belief is that this simple-minded Saint was exceedingly happy and filled with the deepest love of the Holy Spirit.

Science recognises the power of prayer (2)

22 July 2022

"The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results."

James 5:16 NLT

Seven more thoughts to consider: 1) When it comes to praying and getting involved in church, a University of Michigan study found that it reduced the emotional toll of financial stress. 2) A respected gerontologist reported that following heart surgery, private prayer can improve your overall state of well-being and make you feel less anxious. 3) A National Survey of Children's Health confirms that kids who get involved in church have higher educational expectations and do better in maths and reading. And kids who went to church as little as once a month are less likely to repeat a year in school. 4) Psychiatric Services journal cites several studies showing how positive religious beliefs play an important role in recovery from alcohol and/or drug abuse, and greatly reduce the rate of recidivism. 5) When researchers at Yale School of Medicine studied 2,000 people over sixty-five, they found that the ones who attended church were less likely to lose their mental faculties in future years. 6) Anger puts your stress reaction into overdrive and raises your blood pressure. Ohio State University studies confirm that praying for the person you're angry with can calm your anger and foster positive emotions like compassion, which improves your overall health. 7) And Sociological Quarterly reports that teens who find meaning and importance in their faith have better relationships with their parents, which leads to a more satisfying experience for the whole family.

St Laurence's Ludlow - "The Cathedral of the Marches." by Tony Colmans


Part of the Diocese of Hereford, St Laurence's is one of the largest parish churches in England and is nicknamed the Cathedral of the Marches. When I moved to Ludlow in October 2019, I joined the church and soon became a volunteer steward, seeing to the needs of the 60000 plus visitors that we receive every year. A popular attraction is the church tower, 41m (135ft) high with 200 steps to the top for spectacular views of Ludlow and surrounding area.

I used to work in the church shop until it closed in early 2020. A purpose-built church shop opened last year, run for the benefit of the church by a local business. The same business will be running a new church café which will be opening shortly. I was a volunteer gardener at All Saints', but the grounds are very small around St Laurence's and already looked after. We certainly couldn't hold a car boot sale like All Saints'. I certainly don't miss frying onions on Ray's Bistro! Our big annual event is in November during Ludlow's Medieval Fayre weekend when the inside of the church is full of stalls.

Although it's a very grand church, it manages to remain friendly, and we are blessed with a Rector and two recently ordained vicars. The main service of the week is at 10am on Sunday which includes a permanent choir of about 20. I did mention to church officials that I had carried out the duties of server in All Saints'. However, there are quite a few people available for these duties, so I didn't pursue it. I am on the rota to do bible readings during Sunday service, and I help once a month on the Traidcraft stall which sells Fair Trade products.

The church service is very similar to All Saints', but I would say ours is a little higher church. I do miss singing the versions of the Gloria and Holy, Holy, Holy at All Saints', St Laurence's has different versions every week but never the All Saints' versions. There are many items of historical interest within the church. Prince Arthur, older brother of the future Henry VIII, died soon after he came to Ludlow Castle with his new wife Catherine of Aragon. His "heart "was removed and buried in the chancel. His funeral took place in the church after which his body was taken to Worcester Cathedral where he has his own tomb. The misericords in the chancel are one of the finest sets in England. They are used as ordinary seats but when lifted, they have a ledge which could be used as a support when standing for long services. They are about 600 years old but a new one was added to celebrate the present Queen's 90th birthday in 2016. The pews were removed from the church a few years before I joined so I have only seen it with modern seating, allowing more flexibility and space for events. The magnificent 18thC organ is used for recitals as is the Steinway Grand piano and many talks, musical events and exhibitions take place during the year.

I miss the outdoor life in Tenerife and eating out regularly, but the church family is friendly and welcoming in both places and a good way of meeting nice people.


All Saints is planning to start regular Sunday lunch events. These will consist of a two-course roast lunch for 15€.


Car Boot Volunteers'

"Grandad, go under the water and tell me what I'm saying!". We've already dived for lost hairbands and a large pebble, but this swimming pool operation will need extra concentration. In the sunlit blue water Emma's hair is floating all around her head as a stream of bubbles escapes her mouth with a noise sounding like blub, blub, blub.

My thoughts go back to when I, like Emma was six years old, I can't remember swimming with my grandad, but I do recall the whole family being loaded into his old Austin, being squeezed between my brother and sisters for the long drive to Margate. It really was not that long a drive, but back in the day a journey required boxes of picnic stuff, first aid kits, a massive tartan blanket (I presume in case of snowstorms) buckets and spades and tin of those fruit sweets covered in what looked like white dust in the cars glove box. I think the preparation took longer than the journey.

On arrival, everyone would be assigned a task of a box or bag to carry, and the actual beach encampment would not be completed until both Grandad and Grandma had hired, set up their two deckchairs, and if the weather was chilly the added luxury of a windbreak. I do not think Reg or Ethel owned swimming costumes. If it got too hot, skirts were hitched up, trousers rolled up and quick paddle would be enjoyed, but that was as wet as they got. Then it was back to read the paper (and this isn't a lie) with a knotted handkerchief protecting grandad's head. Us children would swim, run in and out of the sea until our home prepared picnic was enjoyed. With the addition of a of a pot of tea for the adults and an ice lolly zoom or a 99 for the kids brought from a wooden kiosk.

Emma's voice brought me back from my memories. "Grandad, grandad, what did I say to you underwater?" she asked. "I don't know Emma, it just sounded like a lot of bubbles". She pulled her pink plastic googles on top of her head and said, "It was I love you Grandad". I replied, "love you too Emma, fancy an ice cream?"

The children enjoy sharing their creations towards the end of the service and it has been lovely to grow in numbers so that we are using a larger table. One thing I enjoy is hearing the children singing and week by week we sing the Our Father more confidently.

Please pray for the children as they grow in their faith and for us to grow in number so that we can develop our children's ministry.


